**PROCEEDINGS**

**Preliminaries**

- The meeting was called to order by Andy Anderson at 4:37 p.m. in the Board Auditorium of the Carruth Administration Center.
- There were no public comments or items from members.

**Superintendent's Update**

- Dr. Cruz went over the following points:
  - ☞ The Adelante conference on multiple languages
  - ☞ Several examples of how things have greatly changed
  - ☞ The need for classrooms to also change
  - ☞ Loss of enrollment is not unique to AISD – we're seeing it in other urban districts around the state and nation
  - ☞ We've adopted the equity framework of the National Equity Project
  - ☞ It may be surprising that LBJ High School had the highest rate of students receiving college credits
  - ☞ Trusting relationships are important to student success
  - ☞ The City of Austin recently adopted a resolution in continued support of AISD
- Discussion points included:
  - ☞ Engagement is part of the instructional core – students will learn more for you than from you
  - ☞ It would be good to give students more musical education at earlier ages
  - ☞ A lot of data show that students in the fine arts tend to do better in other subjects
  - ☞ We may need to pursue waivers to accomplish some of our new and different strategies

**Title I Update**

- Dr. Mary Thomas, Executive Director of State and Federal Compliance and Accountability, went over the following points:
  - ☞ Title I funding is based on census data
  - ☞ The essential reason for Title I is to assist students with the greatest needs
  - ☞ Our Title I funding has continued to go down over the last several years – Austin is losing lower income families due to the high cost of living
  - ☞ This school year we have 75 Title I campuses
  - ☞ Private schools may choose to participate in Title I, and we are charged with passing funding through to them
  - ☞ The expectation is that campuses will not stay on Title I forever – that they will improve
  - ☞ Next school year, 15 campuses will be impacted by Title I funding reductions
  - ☞ Enrollment and program data we use to determine Title I funding is derived on a specific date, and it is set for the rest of the school year

- ☞ Title I funding is for students aged 5-17, but we have certain other grants that go to Pre-K and Early Childhood
- ☞ The upcoming census will have important implications to our Title I funding
- Discussion points included:
  - ☞ We need to get the word out about how important it is to take the census
  - ☞ We also need to get the word out for non-citizens not to be scared to participate
  - ☞ We'll be holding community meetings to help increase understanding of how Title I works
  - ☞ The thresholds for campuses receiving Title I funding are reviewed by the district every year

### **Census 101 and Data Update**

- Joey Crumley, Planning Supervisor, Office of Innovation and Development, went over the following points:
  - ☞ The Decennial Census (DC) is coming up in 2020
  - ☞ The DC is constitutionally meant for one thing – to determine the number of representatives each state has in Congress
  - ☞ The DAC strives to reach every household in the U.S., and participation is mandatory
  - ☞ AISD is already working with the Census Bureau on getting the word out about the importance of participation
  - ☞ A challenge for us is over 85,000 non-citizens living within our boundaries – the Trump administration wants to add a question to the DC about citizenship status, which has received several legal challenges
  - ☞ The U.S. Supreme Court has indicated that it will accelerate the legal process and here this issue in April
  - ☞ The American Community Survey (ACS) is administered every year by the Census Bureau, and it took the place of what used to be the DC “long form”
  - ☞ Only about 3-4 million households across the nation receive the ACS each year – data results are then extrapolated from this relatively small sample size
  - ☞ Although there may be annual variations in the extrapolated data, general trends can still be established, and the ACS is still a valuable planning tool
  - ☞ ACS data are available by many geographic areas, including school districts – data for within AISD boundaries may be different to some extent from that for the City of Austin or Travis County
  - ☞ The ACS does ask about citizenship status, but it hasn't been legally challenged, since the data are estimates only – the DC data are official
  - ☞ Highlights of 2017 ACS data for AISD include: 15.3% population increase since 2008; population increasingly more educated; population below poverty level trending down; birth rate trending down; population below age 5 trending down.
  - ☞ AISD is continuing to lose more of its “market share” of school-age children – charters are a big reason for this, but not the only reason – there are also private schools and home schooling, loss of families due to cost of living, and the size of the market itself declining

### **Charter School Data Update**

- Mr. Crumley went over the following points:
  - ☞ Only charter schools recognized by TEA are being tracked
  - ☞ There are currently 53 charters within or adjacent to AISD, with a total enrollment of 21,924
  - ☞ In some cases, multiple charter campuses are clustered at one location
  - ☞ Most charters are in the eastern, northeastern, and southeastern parts of the district
  - ☞ Whereas charter school enrollment has continued to increase, AISD enrollment has continued to decline since 2012-2013
  - ☞ Charters often start off with just a few grades, then retain students by adding grades each year

- ☞ Only 40% of local charters include any high school grades
- ☞ Last school year, 3 charters were rated IR (compared to 4 for AISD)
- ☞ Most local charters have particularly high percentages of Hispanic and Economically Disadvantaged students – however, a few have particularly high percentages of African American, Asian, or White students

**Conclusion**
